Reflections on Quaker Silence & Friendly Words

"At 16, I came to my first Quaker meeting and fell in love with the deep, extended quiet and stillness. ... I felt at home at last." —John Calvi, Quaker healer and author, Putney (VT) Friends Meeting

In Bill Ashworth's recent (25 February) "How To Quaker" discussion focused on vocal ministry, he asserted that silence and words unite in serving the purpose of worship—deepening into inner *stillness*. He explained that something lies beyond the usual self-test for vocal ministry. Typically, we discern whether the words rising within us during worship are meant for more than just me by a strong sense that I cannot *not* stand and speak. Bill maintains that it's not our urgency to speak but our assessment that the words emerging from our personal experience move beyond a simple reporting on our lives. Instead the words have a meaning, a lesson, an inspiration responsive to conditions within our Meeting, within our world.

I recall the power I experienced during my first tenure as our Meeting's presiding clerk when I switched from inviting Friends into the silence to inviting Friends into worship. Bill's recent talk elucidated this change. Silence is a tool toward intensifying and expanding worship. It's the finger pointing to the moon, not the moon itself. In my mind, silence can be defined by time: Let's take a moment of silence. Worship is undefinable space: Friends let's enter into/return to worship, implying that we would benefit from greater clarity, depth, patience, reverence, or tranquility.

I've always been impressed by the adage that if the business meeting agenda looks to be long and arduous, then instead of shortening opening worship (to provide more time to discuss business), it is wise to expand the duration of worship, allowing for each and all present to deepen into stillness. In this greater collective stillness, Friends are more in touch with Spirit, and it is Spirit that guides business meeting.

Vocal ministry, Bill reminded us, involves words, thoughts, and feelings which come together during worship, not a commentary that we carried into worship with us. It's been our tradition to allow this one exception: The Meeting's clerk brings to business meeting words of inspirational that are typically guided by the clerk's being in a position to sense what words would speak to our Meeting's condition. I've come to believe that the blessing of being the Meeting's clerk is to feel the Spirit of business meeting throughout the month as part of the clerk's ongoing holding the Meeting in the Light. Thus, the inspirational message spoken by the clerk during opening worship arrives while the Meeting is in the process of deepening and serves to further the deepening. I sense that the fuller the worship at the beginning of business meeting, the easier it is for Friends to intermittently revisit worship during business meeting, which helps us stay in touch with Spirit's guidance.

2024.3.1 Friends approved as presented the Minutes from the February 18th Meeting for Worship for Business.

Treasurer's Report: There was little financial activity in February. Contributions were not so high as a regular month, so we had a bit of a deficit, but year-to-date we are still ahead. Spending has been restrained in typical So. Mountain Friends Meeting fashion. We still have plenty of money in our checking account.

Ministry & Counsel (M&C): The artwork that Becky has put up on display in the Meetinghouse is by our Grants Pass, female, Quaker, artistic Elders, Marybeth Webster and Colombe Leinau. This upcoming Soul Food Sunday, we will celebrate these artists. Colombe will attend in person and Marybeth will join via Zoom. Both will speak with us about their art.

Peace & Social Concerns (P&SC): Our two hosted attendees, Connor Babbitt and Rook Smith, to Friends Committee on National Legislation's (FCNL) Lobby Days are at Lobby Days right now! The total expense this year is \$1,720. Some of the cost was also paid by the FCNL Advocacy Team. Our partners in our work educating about Christian Nationalism, Medford Friends Church, First Presbyterian Church of Ashland, and Medford's United Church of Christ (UCC), are very interested in hosting two showings of the movie God and Country, one in Medford and one in Ashland, upon its release.

Nominating Committee for 2024:

The following persons have been appointed to the Nominating Committee: Wyatt Banks, Althea Godfrey, Nancy Spear, & Richard Spencer. The committee will be contacting Friends about ways to serve the Meeting, or Friends can contact the committee.

Joint Committee (JC): JC incurred a debt during COVID because the rentals dried up, but all the back bills as a result of that time have now been paid off, including the loan from one of our members. Rentals have stabilized with a core group of recurring rentals. The committee, at the Meeting's request, has hired Nicole Brady to clean the building twice a month. She will arrange for carpet and window cleaning as well. JC is also well on its way to maintaining a \$10,000 minimum balance for when big unexpected things happen (e.g., water heater fails). The committee is cognizant of the Meeting's desire to get off natural gas and hopes to be able to do so within the next few years.

Technology: Friends suggested improving partnerships such that the person who is clerking an event (e.g., First Hour) is supported by another person who can set up the virtual meeting system and run the tech aspects of the meeting. Perhaps we need an official contact person in charge of maintaining the technology.
