Inspired by Jean Semrau's leading, expressed in this letter:

"Dear Friends,

I have a dream for our community. A dream for our Meeting.

We all know that in the months to come there will be increasing violence, confrontation, anger and fear in our world. In my dream, Quakers are a nonviolent peace force. Quakers are the ones who stand in protection around those who are being threatened: Muslims, Jews, people of color, LGBTQ folks, undocumented people, "dissidents," and so on. The threats may come from any fearful, angry group of people, or from armed police or military personnel.

My personal experiences of standing, simply standing peacefully, in protection of others, include standing at the California-Mexican border to help decrease Border Patrol violence; standing with other Witness for Peace volunteers on the Nicaragua-Honduras border during the Contra war; standing around a mosque after 9-11 so worshippers could safely enter and leave; and standing in a circle around the home of a fellow war tax resister which was about to be seized by the IRS. In every case, the presence of people simply standing peacefully did decrease the violence.

I think Quakers are the very people who should be among those standing, witnessing, being a calming presence. Ideally, we would be trained (or refreshed) in nonviolent civilian protection. I would like this to be part of our Meeting's mission and community service. It would also increase our visibility, if we wore simple armbands or t-shirts identifying the Quaker Peacekeepers."

Friends are encouraged to attend the retreat in person so that we can feel a stronger sense of community, but hybrid will be available if being present in the room is not possible.

Under the Guidance of Seasoned Quaker Helen Park

Helen Park has been a member of Eugene Monthly Meeting since 1978. She founded Wellsprings Friends School, an alternative high school, in 1994 and served as its first School Head. A professional educator, Helen believes learning is most effective in an environment of trust, curiosity and joy. Grounded in Spirit, she was one of the first Alternatives to Violence Project facilitators in Oregon, leading nonviolence workshops in prisons and communities for over 30 years.

Soul Food Sunday: Rise of Meeting * Sunday 10 March/Daylight Savings





James's Journey

My journey to Nashville, TN, began about two years ago. While walking down the street in Ashland, I received a deep and powerful inner invitation to begin preparations for a potential move. The inner calling was strong, persistent, gentle, and full of peace and clarity. I have received inner callings like this before and is what led me to choose my college, medical school, emergency medicine residency, and is what led me here to Ashland. I was not given specifics about a location to move to, but as I pondered what I wanted for this next chapter of life, I knew that I wanted to be deeply engaged in helping others on their spiritual awakening journey. I also wanted to center my life around a contemplative, post-evangelical, progressive Christian community.

I was looking to be a part of a multigenerational community of a few hundred people, one that supports deep inner transformation, whole person development, and mature spiritual engagement in the world. I was open to





After I chose to visit Nashville based on the church, I did some research for jobs and happened to discover that the area had just started a new emergency medicine (EM) residency training program and was also about to open a new medical school. I have been hired at both the new EM residency and as a community faculty member for the new Medical school. I am excited to train the next generation of physicians in the art of medicine. I also started a business to lead physician wellness retreats to help others live more deeply aligned with their soul and purpose.

This journey was actually very similar to how I ended up at our Friends gathering. I had taken about six months and traveled to various spiritual communities around the Rogue Valley. The Friends Meeting was the last one I visited, and I had given up hope of finding a local community that was contemplative, progressive and that honored the spark of God in All people. After my first Friends Meeting I knew I was home. After a five year process of reconstructing my faith life, the Friends Meeting has been a safe place for me to rest, rejuvenate and restore my spirit and nervous system. The community has been a welcoming place to open my heart and allow deep light, love, and healing to enter the deep recesses of my heart.

Thank you for a wonderful 2 years of fellowship, love, and encouragement. You all have taught me so much about living a life of authenticity and holding the tensions of life in the Light. The Friends Meeting has modeled what a life of deep contemplation and action, rooted in Spirit and community, can look like. I carry all of you in my heart as I move to Nashville and am grateful to have been called your Friend.

Prioritizing Worldly Concerns

9 am Sunday 31 March



Biennially, Friends Committee on National Legislation (FCNL) asks its member meetings to help it prioritize the issues it will emphasize in the new Congress that will begin work in the upcoming year. During First Hour on Fifth Sunday, the Peace & Social Concerns Committee will lead a discussion with that discernment as its goal.

As usual, it will be hard to choose among the areas of concern, since Friends are interested in all of them. We will, however, do our best. Here are the issues from which we must choose five:

- Climate change
- Climate justice mitigating the disproportionate burden on poor people and nations
- Economic fairness amending the tax code, raising the minimum wage, and strengthening the safety net
- Criminal justice ending mass incarceration and police bias and brutality, and promoting restorative justice
- Protecting democracy access to the ballot, securing the election process
- Address institutional racism centering voices of indigenous and peoples of color
- Tribal rights and sovereignty
- Peacebuilding and confronting militarism
- Enhance diplomacy and Congress's role in decisions to engage militarily
- Expand access to basic needs healthcare, housing, and nutrition
- End gun violence
- Nuclear disarmament
- Immigration reform

Letter on US Policies Toward Cuba

The Peace & Social Concerns Committee subscribed to a letter to President Biden urging him to return US policies toward Cuba to where they stood before Trump altered them. That "reset" was something Biden had promised when he campaigned for the presidency in 2020.

The letter was drafted and circulated by ACERE: Alliance For Cuba Engagement And Respect, a coalition of organizations and individuals that believe that sanctions and economic blockades are not the right answers to resolve conflicts. The letter urged Biden to allow for trade and investment with the growing private sector on the island, unfettered freedom to travel to Cuba, a fully functional US embassy in Havana, and an end to the designation of Cuba as a sponsor of terrorism, which "negatively impacts the well-being of our families in Cuba and hampers their access to everyday basic living essentials, financial operations, and digital platforms."


The letter points out that our economic sanctions have precipitated a humanitarian crisis on the island and has "significantly contributed to an unprecedented immigration crisis on our Southern Border, as tens of thousands of Cubans have lost hope and have left their homeland in search of economic stability." —Herb Rothschild

2024.2.1 Friends approved as presented the Minutes from the 21 January Meeting for Worship for Business.

Treasurer's Report: We received a lot of January donations, which brought us up to about where we should be with regards to the budgeted income. Our expenses thus far this year have been a little lower than anticipated, so our current balance is ahead for the year. Friendship and Hospitality has been submitting receipts for things that used to be donated in kind, so those expenses are higher than budgeted, which matches our expectations.

Budgeting will be starting soon. There has been talk in the past about ensuring our budgeting follows our values. More information about Friends' wishes would be helpful for the Finance Committee. Issues that typically come up are:

- How conservative should we be in terms of spending matching versus exceeding the income coming in on an annual basis?
- Peace and Social Concerns donations—hearing from some that we should donate more and some saying we should donate less.

Friends suggested holding another winnowing session on budgeting. The Finance Committee will come up with some queries that may help Friends give input that will be helpful to the Committee in guiding their budgeting process. This session will either be held on 3 March (or 7 April), pending Finance Committee's needs.

Ministry & Counsel (M&C): A farewell to James will be included in the Soul Food Sunday celebration in March. M&C is hosting a training retreat, Nonviolent Presence, to refresh and update ourselves in the peaceful presence, even in the face of violence, that we already know how to do/be. Helen Park from Eugene Friends Meeting will be our trainer. This event is scheduled for 23 March from 1-5 pm. The

committee noted appreciation for Becky Hale in rotating the artwork in the Meetinghouse. Currently, on display is the artwork of Marybeth Webster and Colombe Leinau.

Peace & Social Concerns (P&SC): P&SC has signed onto a petition by the Alliance For Cuba Engagement And Respect (ACERE) to president Biden regarding mending relationships with Cuba. *Related article: Page 4.*

In working with Alma Rosa Alvarez, P&SC was able to get two candidates for participation in the Friends Committee on National Legislation's (FCNL's) Spring Lobby Days. Friends expressed the desire to meet those candidates both before and after their participation. Discussion ensued over the source of funding the participation of these young people in Lobby Days. Friends shared that this activity furthers our values and invigorates our Meeting.

2024.2.2 Friends approved funding up to two individuals to participate in FCNL's 2024 Lobby Days with such funding to come from the Meeting reserves.

Herb has been in contact with the few respondents to our letter on Christian Nationalism: Medford Friends Church, First Presbyterian Church of Ashland, and an additional response from Medford's United Church of Christ (UCC). All three respondents are interested in a viewing of the film *God and Country*, with all four organizations listed as sponsors of the showing of this film. Herb will continue to work with these responding faith organizations to set up one or two events containing showings of this film.

FCNL has requested that Meetings help them discern the most pertinent issues for the next Congress. P&SC will host a session on the fifth Sunday in March where Friends can discuss, and get a better understanding of, the issues that FCNL has identified. *Details: Page 4*

LISTENING


